GPT-4 Queries on Public Consultation

at 23 June 2023

Context/Purpose

The announcement of GPT-4 – a new “model” in Open AI’s GPT generative AI toolbox – provided an opportunity to explore how the tool might respond to queries about public consultation.

Task:

“Why should a civil society organization respond to global calls-for-input and public consultation for laws, regulations, guidance frameworks, etc.?”
